We act as the peak body for dance in Queensland and advocate for dance across government policy, sector planning and industry initiatives.



FINANCIAL REPORT

In 2022 Ausdance QLD planned for growth and further diversification of revenue streams. Both of these goals were achieved, but to a lessor extent than planned. Agile adjustments were made to ensure we retained our solid financial position throughout 2022.

Total revenue for 2022 was \$298,167, as compared to \$196,527 in 2021. Expenses grew from \$218,669 in 2021 to \$308,362 in 2022 due to QDEC22 and additional project production costs.

Ausdance QLD has operational funding from Arts Queensland of S150,000 for the next two years (2023 and 2024). Overall Ausdance QLD's financial results for 2022 are sound and place the organisation in a solid position for future operations and further growth.
