In our wildest imagination, we could not have foreseen a year like 2020. To be honest, prior to this memorable year, some people wondered if there was a genuine need for peak bodies in the arts.

### But then Covid.

On Friday 13th March, nearly all dance stopped. Ausdance QLD had 120 members and three part-time staff, along with an active Management Committee (Board) who began working around the clock with members of the Queensland dance community to navigate restrictions, provide emotional support and develop strategies to get us all dancing once more.

Over the whole year, nearly 10,000 people downloaded our Dance and Physical Performing Arts Industry COVID 19 safe plan; a document required by Queensland Health to ensure safety when returning to dance activities. Our team dealt directly in consultations, Zoom sessions, emails and telephone conversations with 12,290 members of the dance community. We had extraordinary help from Stephen Stewart who, whilst on Jobkeeper from Virgin Australia, authored, consulted and advised Ausdance QLD on this exceptional industry plan, as well as working with the Choral, Vocal, Instrumental and Musical Theatre Industry COVID 19 safe plan. The dance community in Queensland led Australia by working together to return safely to the activity we ALL enjoy.

We are incredibly proud of the work of Ausdance QLD during 2020 because we stepped up when it mattered. We helped businesses, individuals, community groups and companies through an inconceivably difficult year and brought hundreds more people and groups into the Ausdance QLD fold, and now represent all traditions, styles, regions and cultures around this great state.

### 2020 saw Ausdance QLD membership grow by 916%.

It was a wake-up call. We must not ever return to dancing in isolation from our peers, community, different genres and organisations. We are stronger when we work together and, going forward, this strength will be the difference between surviving and thriving. Thank you so very much for playing a part during 2020, for your care and for your love – both of each other and of the joy and beauty of dance.

In 2020, in the face of COVID-19, Queensland Ballet (QB) collaborated with Ausdance QLD to imagine a dance sector return-to-work path forward.



**Core Operations** 

The core operations of Ausdance QLD provides services, education, advice and resources for the dance sector in Queensland. During 2020 Ausdance QLD delivered the following;

- 1. Financial administration advice in relation to Jobkeeper, Jobseeker and small businesses
- 2. Online pedagogy, grant writing, marketing, video production, editing workshops
- 3. Mental Health Counselling service
- 4. Workplace Health & Safety templates for studios, organisations and groups
- 5. Safe Dance Ausdance QLD endorsement process
- 6. 37 information, catch up, consultation and check in sessions across sectors, communities and dance styles including independent dancers, ballroom, social dance, community dance, ballet, live performances, dance studios
- 7. Email and telephone COVID 19 advice 12 hours per day, seven days per week from March to July

Response to COVID-19

### **COVID Impact Sector Survey**

Ausdance QLD designed a survey for dance professionals living in Australia (Ausdance members and non-members) that addressed:

- Demographics and employment
- Financial status before COVID-19
- Financial impact of COVID-19
- Practical impact
- Mental impact

The call for survey responses was communicated via the websites, social media and mailing lists of Ausdance QLD, Ausdance National, Ausdance New South Wales and Ausdance Victoria.

A workforce of 1,913 people was reported through the survey with 99% of respondents reporting their businesses had been negatively affected by COVID-19. Virtually every respondent's work had been impacted in some way, with the effects rippling out to thousands of employees, family members and dance community members. Financial stability was considered the biggest practical challenge with respondents estimating a \$8,063,801 loss of income due to the impacts of COVID-19.

Many respondents (66.18%) anticipated significant losses of 50-100% of their monthly income. Financial concerns also contributed to anxiety. This analysis reveals a sector that was bracing for unprecedented financial losses with most respondents (78.92%) having been reliant on their dance practice/ business income.\*

### Framework and Principles for Returning to Dance

Ausdance QLD followed the comprehensive work undertaken by the Australian Institute of Sport to develop an appropriate similar framework to return to dance.

This document considered contact, hygiene practices, class numbers, participation and audiences and was finalised in collaboration with BlakDance and the Ausdance network. It was published and distributed nationally and formed the basis of returning to dance for all States and Territories with the endorsement of the Chief Medical Officer of the Australian Institute of Sport.

## Dance and Physical Performing Arts Industry COVID Safe Plan

Following the publication of Framework and Principles for Returning to Dance the Queensland government announced 'restricted industries' would be allowed to recommence activities with an approved industry plan. There was no template for this required resource but with the leadership of a professionally skilled volunteer, Stephen Stewart, Ausdance QLD carried out consultations with companies, sectors, groups and communities all around the State over five days before submitting a document to Queensland Health in less than two weeks. This document, now on its seventh revision, has been the foundation document for all dance activities to operate safely.

From the controversially renamed Recreational Structured Partner Dancing (so renamed to differentiate 'social dancing' from nightclub dancing) to contemporary dance, to ballet and traditional dance, the details of the 'DPPA' plan are now comprehensively understood by thousands of people. The document was downloaded 8,716 times from the Ausdance QLD website.


# **OUR WORK**

Artistic Programs

Ausdance QLD provided funding and support for six artistic residency projects. Some of these are still underway or yet to be activated due to the impact of COVID-19. Residencies exploring the engagement of dance in public spaces included:

- Annie Hill: An experienced researcher at the University of Queensland, Annie will gather together stroke survivors (including those with aphasia), dance instructors, dance movement therapists, physiotherapists and speech pathologists to co-create a dance intervention for people with stroke and post-stroke aphasia.
- Ashleigh Musk & Michael Smith: This dynamic duo undertook their week-long residency with The Farm at HOTA on the Gold Coast, working with Daniele Constance on the access and inclusion elements in the development of their work 'Fertile Ground'.
- Liesel Zink: Ausdance QLD funding supported the residency which included an open public sharing in the form of an online workshop, testing choreographic exercises and receiving feedback and a showing for invited guests and key industry members.
- **Bring A Plate Inclusive Dance Company:** The Ausdance QLD residency support will be used to run a series of workshops in Brisbane and on the Gold Coast to utilize the re-engagement with public space to run outdoor dance workshops.

# Residencies for First Nations' and Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) artists

- Katina Olsen: Katina's residency is underway. With her deep research, Katina is exploring possible responses to the current climate and environmental crisis in the knowledge that it is the wisdom of her ancestors, that we need to sit with & listen to (the stories of loss, survival & adaption). These learnings inform choreography and production of a dance performance.
- Naavikaran: the Ausdance QLD residency produced a short film capturing the experiences of people of colour who are LGBTIQ+ based locally in Brisbane, QLD. All artists in the involved in the projects were BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Colour) and have a range of lived, intersectional experiences (faith, disability, etc.) empowered by this residency.

## **Ausdance Educators Queensland**

Ausdance Educators Queensland subcommittee is a group of active volunteers who support the professional development of primary, middle & secondary teachers across all school sectors in Queensland. A planned conference was cancelled, and the work of the committee pivoted to the design, development, production and sales of a digital video resource titled 'Moving My Way', in which choreographer, Richard Causer breaks down elements of the creative process to support curriculum learning of Year 12 dance students.

- Rebuilding policies and procedures for Ausdance QLD and members •
- Ensuring consistent learning, improvement and systemic change in • response to First Nations' priorities
- Commence consultation work and research into working conditions, pay • rates, regulation and music licensing

Priority 1. Advocacy and Leadership for the Queensland Dance Sector

# **GOALS**

- Queensland dance sector feels supported and well represented in local, national, global and digital spaces.
- Queensland dance sector can easily access timely, accurate and comprehensive information relating to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- The Queensland dance sector is regulated with standards in safe dance practice, education and pay scales.
- Ausdance QLD has a large, diverse and active membership who are able to communicate their needs and have confidence that their input is being actioned.
- Ausdance QLD is the frontline body of knowledge for the dance sector in Queensland and is active in scanning, connecting and promoting the work, efforts and contributions that dance plays in the lives of Queenslanders

During 2020, the Queensland dance sector felt supported and well represented in local, national and digital spaces. Timely, accurate and comprehensive information was delivered to the whole dance community, including the Framework and Principles for Returning to Dance and Seven revisions of the Dance and Physical Performing Arts Industry COVID 19 Safe Plan. General consultations held in July 2020 informed ongoing considerations of a regulatory strategy. Ausdance QLD membership grew to over 1000 members by the end of 2020 and the diversity of membership increased to include more than thirty different styles of dance, greater First Nations' representation and a broad geographical spread across the State. Ausdance QLD is now the frontline body of knowledge for the dance sector for dance activities, operations and management of organisations.

# **ACHIEVEMENT OF STRATEGIC PRIORITIES**

**PRIORITY 2: Promote sector development and** sustainability

# **GOALS**

**AUSDANCE QLD** 

- Queensland dance practitioners and educators have access to a wide range of professional development opportunities.
- The Queensland dance sector is known for creativity, innovation, best practice and critical thinking.
- Queensland dance sector has increased business operational and strategic business/operational knowledge.
- Dance practitioners, educators and organisations in Queensland are successful and sustainable with astute entrepreneurial skills to navigate the cultural economy with ease and acumen.
- Local, national, global and digital audiences enjoy exemplary dance and dance-related education including dance-led interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary work from Queensland creators.

During 2020, professional development requirements changed and Ausdance QLD's programs adapted to respond to urgent needs including training in video editing, online pedagogy, ticketing systems, financial/ tax accounting, WH&S, COVID 19 safe productions, grant-writing and marketing. The Queensland dance sector led Australia's arts sector in returning to work and adapting to new operational requirements. Implementation of WH&S policies and procedures, along with compliance with the DPPA COVID 19 safe plan increased the operational capabilities of all dance organisations. The dance sector developed and demonstrated great flexibility and resilience during the year. Ausdance QLD supported and advised on digital production of performances, workshops and residencies and undertook six residency projects over the course of 2020.

# **ACHIEVEMENT OF STRATEGIC PRIORITIES**

PRIORITY 3: Improve dance accessibility and diversity

## **GOALS**

- Local, national, international and global audiences' value, enjoy and participate in Queensland dance.
- Queensland dance sector considers and embraces social change relating to First Nations Peoples and diverse communities.
- Full and equal opportunity is available to all Queenslanders who want to practice and experience dance.
- Increase accessibility for First Nations dance practitioners to participate in and contribute to broader dance experiences.
- Queensland dance reflects the diverse identity of our state.
- Regional, rural and metropolitan dance practitioners, educators and organisations feel supported and well represented.

Membership and participation in Ausdance QLD's services and programs expanded locally and nationally during 2020 as a result of the COVID 19 specific support provided to the dance sector and the alliance with national organisations including the Ausdance network. IN/FORM online magazine highlighted the issues of accessibility faced in the dance sector and explored ways to improve this. A growing understanding and community of First Nations dance practitioners and arts professionals combined with the Management Committee's undertaking to work towards First Nations' policy leadership and Cultural Capability training has increased accessibility for First Nations' members. Currently Ausdance QLD membership reflects diversity of dance in the state more accurately than previously before. Regional membership increased to 45% of the total Ausdance QLD community.

# **ACHIEVEMENT OF STRATEGIC PRIORITIES**

PRIORITY 4: Maintain strong organisational capacity and sustainability

## **GOALS**

- Members feel confident that the organisation can consistently provide high quality programs, services and advice for the dance sector.
- Ausdance QLD standard of corporate governance is working towards best practice.
- Ausdance QLD is financially secure with diverse sources of revenue.
- Clear policies and procedures are in place to ensure transparency and accountability.
- Ausdance QLD adheres to Not-for-Profit Association Rules and regulations as stipulated by state and federal legislation.

Ausdance QLD delivered high quality targeted programs and services for members during the year. Development of governance systems, including review of all policies and procedures and governance training for all Management Committee members means our people are able to see how governance is a vital tool for success and sustainability. Clear policies and procedures are in place, along with monthly data and service reporting the Management Committee and transparent decision-making processes. Ausdance QLD is compliant with the Australian Charities and Not-forprofits Commission (ACNC) and Queensland Government Office of Fair Trade rules governing charities. During 2020, Ausdance QLD successfully applied for a charity fundraising license.
