ABOUT GAJA (AUNTY) ROSLYN WATSON

Gaja Roslyn is a Muninjarli and Birri Gubba woman based in Magan-Djin/Meeanjin (Brisbane).

Roslyn began training as a classical ballet dancer at the age of 10 at Madonna MacAuliffe's Ballet Academy and later with her senior student Marilyn Creery. Prodigiously talented, driven and determined ,and with strong community and family support, she was awarded the first ever Abstudy grant to study classical ballet full-time at Kathleen Gorham's Ballet Academy and then after a successful audition, the Australian Ballet School as a full-time student in 1971. She was the first Indigenous dancer accepted into this school and graduated with Honours in 'Modern' from this twoyear Diploma course.

Her professional ballet career began as a dancer with the Dance Company (NSW) – later Sydney Dance Company - and included the production and touring of 'Brolga' with world-renowned actor and dancer David Gulpilil (deceased) in 1973.

She joined the Dance Theater of Harlem School in New York and was accepted as an apprentice dancer with the company before returning to join Queensland Ballet. While with Queensland Ballet, she led Isolated Areas Teaching Tours across the state and was seconded to dance at the Third World and Black Arts Festival in Lagos, Nigeria with the Aboriginal Islander Dance Theatre in 1977.

Roslyn then toured nationally and internationally with Australian Dance Theatre. Following these tours, she commenced teaching with National Aboriginal and Islander Skills & Development Association (NAISDA). Upon arrival in Paris in 1982, she established her own company, Compagnie Brolga. While there, with her French husband Michel Trillot, she co-choreographed/ produced 'Voyage au dout d'un Rêve' (Voyage at the end of a Dream) with Eric Sennen and Mark Baldwin and performed at Théâtre 18.

In a generation and cohort of ground-breaking First Nations dancers, Watson covered expansive ground both literally and artistically, studying and later teaching contemporary dance in Australia, performing with Australian Dance Theatre throughout Southeast Asia and Europe, appearing at Edinburgh Festival in 1980. Her commitment to her First Nations' heritage was reflected in her choreography and activity in nationwide projects for First Nations dancers.

GAJA ROSLYN WATSON

A respected Elder in First Nations and dance communities around Australia and across the world, Roslyn's vision is access for and greater understanding of young First Nations' dancers. Her achievements in the ballet world, both professionally and Culturally are unparalleled.

Dreamtime stories are the oral form of the spiritual Dreaming which comprises:

Art: the visual form, **Customs**: the practical form, **Dance**: the physical form, **Music**: the acoustic form, **Totems**: the spiritual forms, **Lore**: the cultural form, **Lands**: the geographical forms. Altogether they form an all-encompassing, mystical whole: **The Dreaming**

Nunukul Yuggera's Indigenous dance artists actively stimulate participants by combining elements of Aboriginal history, storytelling, cultural and religious beliefs. By embracing Indigenous culture, our artists aim to spark thoughts and questions to inspire teachers and leave them with a hunger to discover more.

ABOUT NUNUKUL YUGGERA ABORIGINAL DANCE COMPANY

The Nunukul Yuggera Aboriginal Dancers, also known as Yugimbir & Nugi Aboriginal Dancers.

The Nunukul Yuggera Aboriginal Dancers have been in existence for over 25 years traveling the world extensively showcasing Traditional Aboriginal culture through song, dance and other various forms of cultural expression. Stella also said "I dance as a political statement, because disabled bodies are inherently political, but I mostly dance for all the same reasons anyone else does: because it heals my spirit and fills me with joy." ABOUT PAT

Since Pat Swell was appointed Chief Executive of Access Arts in 2012, the company has established a Theatre and Dance Ensemble for people with disability. Their first performance was at Queensland Theatre in 2015 and their next public performance in June marks Access Arts' 40th anniversary. Other programs for people with disability have ranged from dancing with ballerinas from the Royal Ballet on the South Bank, to a children's dance project in Townsville with Dancenorth.

ABOUT ROBERT

Robert dhurwain McLellan is proud Gooreng Gooreng descendant of the Wide Bay region. Growing up as a performing artist, he was a CSTD and RAD student and now with over ten years' experience as a teacher and producer. Still dedicated to the development of arts capabilities in the regions, he is also a member of the First Nations' Arts and Cultures Panel, (FNACP) Arts QLD.

Robert is an experienced Director and governance practitioner. He is a graduate of the Australian Institute of Company Directors, a chartered manager and fellow of the Institute of Managers and Leaders ANZ. Robert is currently appointed as an Industry Fellow of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Science with the University of QLD as well as Program Manager for the Language Data Commons of Australia (LDaCA), building national research infrastructure. His professional experience also extends to cultural studies with a focus on Indigenous languages, sociology, arts and communications. A strong advocate for truth telling and speaking up for Aboriginal people's rights and justice, economic advancement, and to ensure First Nations voices are authentically valued and embraced across all levels of society, Robert is a leader who is passionate about building culturally inclusive, honourable, and cohesive communities.

ABOUT RITA

Rita Pryce is a Kulkalgal and Kawrareg woman currently based on Gimuy Barra. She is Artistic Director/CEO of the Pryce Centre for Culture & Arts. Rita travelled to the UK after winning the British Council's Accelerate Leadership Award in 2012. Her experience there inspired her to establish the Cultural School of Arts through the Pryce Centre, which received multi-year funding from Arts Queensland. This will allow First Nations youth to access and explore Cultural and creative arts training, production, development and career opportunities closer to their communities. She is committed to raising the profile of dance throughout North Queensland and the raw talent that exists in the region. She is passionate about empowering Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people with everything she's learnt throughout her career along with other valuable information from Elders and Cultural Practitioners handed down over the generations. This includes respect, Cultural pedagogies and survival skills, which are key to ensuring our young people stay safe, well and on track.



CURRICULUM

AUSTRALIAN CURRICULUM v9.0

Lucy Flook | Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority

In this presentation, we will explore the key messages from the Australian Curriculum v9.0: The Arts - Dance and explore what has changed in the curriculum. We will reflect on how we are currently framing Dance in our schools and consider the opportunities presented by the Australian Curriculum v9.0: The Arts - Dance.

We will look at the role of Dance and its capacity to inspire, engage and challenge students; including how to help students make connections to value the skills developed through choreographing, performing and responding to dance.

This presentation will also contain a preview of QCAA resources to support schools with familiarisation and planning for Australian Curriculum: The Arts v9.0.

ABOUT LUCY

Lucy is currently the QCAA Principal Project Officer for Australian Curriculum: The Arts, and has previously worked in External Assessment across Learning Areas. With experience such as being a Head of Department, Curriculum 2 Classroom (C2C) Arts Writer and Expert Writing Team member for the QCAA General Dance Syllabus, Lucy is a passionate Arts advocate. She has developed education notes and packages for the Qld Music Festival, Qld Theatre, Out of The Box Festival and Brisbane Powerhouse's World Theatre Festival. Lucy is currently the Qld choreographer for the Australian Girls Choir.



CONTEMPORARY DANCE PRACTICE Tyrel Dulvarie

Tyrel will lead a contemporary dance class with a focus on safe dance practices, technique, as well as movement exploration. Throughout the class we will build on skills in order to move efficiently, creatively & dynamically.

ABOUT TYREL

Tyrel Dulvarie is from Kimuy, he is a descendant of the Yirrganydji, Djirrabul, Kalkadoon and Umpila peoples.

He trained at the Aboriginal Centre for the Performing Arts in 2011-2013. In 2015, he spent the year part of Sydney Dance Company's Pre-Professional Program before touring with Hugh Jackman's Broadway to Oz musical production.

Tyrel joined Bangarra Dance Theatre in 2016 where he toured nationally & abroad the productions: OUR land people stories, Bennelong, Terrain, Dark Emu, 30 Years of Sixty Five Thousand, Ochres, Spirit: a retrospective and Ibis. In 2019 he received the Australian Dance Award for Outstanding Performance by a Male Dancer for his standout performance in 30 Years of Sixty Five Thousand. In 2021, Tyrel relocated to Meanjin, where he joined Australasian Dance Collective, making his debut in "Succession", the collective's joint production with the Youth Ensemble.

He then premiered the Collective's triple bill production "Three", performing works by Melanie Lane, Jack Lister and Hofesh Shechter. Later that year Tyrel had the privilege of performing Forgery, an artificially intelligent designed work created by Alisdair Macindoe & Josh Mu.

In July 2022, the Australasian Dance Collective returned with a new triple bill production of "Three 2.0", where he performed new dance works by Cass Mortimer-Eipper, Kate Harman, and Gabrielle Nankivell.

In mid-July 2022, Tyrel decided to venture out as a freelance artist and dive into new mediums of the arts. Currently, Tyrel is a part of a new Indigenous-Australian theatre work "Tracker" by Australian Dance Theatre and Ilbijerri Theatre Company. Tracker is to perform at all major art festivals in Australia this year.

Tyrel has a strong love and value for culture, representation, diversity, fashion, and the arts.

PANEL DISCUSSION

COLLABORATION IN CHOREOGRAPHIC PRACTICE Gavin Webber and Kate Harman | The Farm

In this discussion/presentation, we will celebrate The Farm's collaborative way of working to inspire people to be part of something greater than themselves. This is not just a creative practice but a way of being in the world. We will talk about how we do it, why we love it and acknowledge the difficulties we face in a world that asks you to "be your own brand". Using examples from a number of collaborations over 25 plus years, and the experience of creating with young people as part of our Greenhouse Youth Ensemble, we'll dive into the way we work together and answer the ultimate farming question: who the hell runs this thing?

ABOUT GAVIN

Gavin is one of the Artistic Directors of The Farm. a company based on the Gold Coast, whose work has been described as the gateway drug to contemporary dance. He started dancing late after many lost years spent hitch-hiking, skiing, writing, camping and studying. Eventually he decided to make art instead and joined Meryl Tankard's Australian Dance Theatre and following that, Belgian company Ultima Vez. Throughout his career Gavin has worked between Australia and Europe and was Artistic Director of Dancenorth from 2005 to 2009. He took the company from regional Australia to national and international touring and then left for Europe once again to join PVCtanz in Germany. He has been nominated twice for a Helpmann Award, was awarded the Sidney Myer Individual Performing Arts Award in 2017 and had a sandwich named after him at Lucia's Coffee shop in Adelaide in the 1990's. In 2018 The Farm won a Helpmann for TIDE, in 2019 a Drover's Award for Cockfight and in 2020 an Ausdance award for TIDE. Gavin still writes. camps and studies but the hitch-hiking and skiing are over for the time being at least.

ABOUT KATE

Kate Harman is an Australian dancer and choreographer. Her work orients around the notion of the body as a container for personal, genetic, and cultural memory, an archive of sorts, containing limitless realms of possibilities. Her practice, at its core, looks to relieve the dancers and the audiences bodies from the constraints built by political, cultural and aesthetic hierarchies.

Influence from her years working in Germany within mixed genres has resulted in her work taking various forms (performance, installation, durational performance and participatory works made with young people and amateurs). She is a founding member of Gold Coast company The Farm and with them has created numerous works including the Helpmann Award winning TIDE.

Ange Pratt is currently Learning Area Manager (The Arts) at QCAA, but has a long history of involvement with QCAA as the Chair for the development of Dance Senior Syllabus (2010) and State and District Review Panel Chair roles in Dance. During her time as a university lecturer in Education, her focus was curriculum and assessment across a range of learning areas. Ange also has 16 years' experience as a Dance teacher in secondary and primary contexts.

ABOUT LEISA

Leisa holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Dance (QUT 1990); a Graduate Diploma in Education (QUT 1991); Certificate IV in Training and Assessment; Acrobatic Arts syllabus teaching certification and Teachers in EDTA syllabus in Tap, Jazz and Ballet. She is the Chief Confirmer and a Lead Marker for the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority; a 2018 Queensland Ballet Ambassador for Practicing Educators and HOD The Arts at North Lakes State College. Leisa collaboratively wrote the Certificate courses for North Lakes State College which have been implemented since 2016.

After working in the health sector and becoming a registered counselor, Aimee combined her therapeutic skills with her creative industry experience to create The Hey Mate Project. This project provides accessible, proactive, preventative, educational and industry informed support for creative professionals.



CONTEMPORARY DANCE PRACTICE Dr. Nerida Matthaei | Phluxus2 Collective

This practical workshop will explores tools for assisting in the development of personal choreographic artistry within a new creative process. Participants will dance, brainstorm, create and be led through devising choreographic practices. These skills are particularly relevant to the IA3 in the senior curriculum and can also can be applied and useful to choreographic based education foci across contexts.

ABOUT NERIDA

Dr Nerida Matthaei is an award-winning choreographer, movement director, performer, educator, writer and the Artistic Director of Phluxus2 Dance Collective. The underlying pulse of her work comes from an ingrained passion for contemporary choreographic practice as a beautifully planned anarchy of mind-body collaboration. Driven by challenging socio-political orthodoxy and breaking conventions, she is a much sought-after collaborator internationally. Nerida is committed to providing inspired and inspiring grass root projects and actively contributes to uplifting communities through the craft of dance. Nerida completed a Doctor of Creative Industries (Research) in choreography in 2018.
